Amigurumi Hearts.

The word AMIGURUMI is a portmanteau of the Japanese words ami, meaning "crocheted or knitted", and nuigurumi, meaning "stuffed doll".

On the road that I live is a support group. We check on each other, ask if we can help anyone or if anyone needs anything. One lady works at Aintree Hospital. She suggested that the hearts could be made to help the patients and their family to think of each other as they are unable to have visitors. You will need: Crochet hook (size 4), Wool of any colour, a yarn needle, Buttons (min 2cm), Stuffing (this could be from a spare pillow)



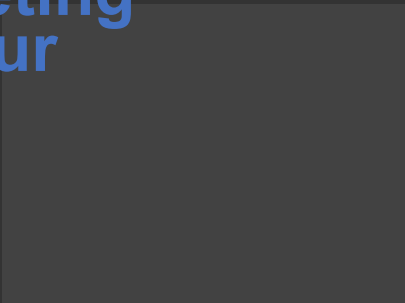
