Do you know what a coat of arms is and what it is for?






A coat of arms is a unique design that identifies a family, individual or organisation. Coats of arms were originally used in battle so that soldiers could identify other people on their side. They would be drawn on shields, flags and held up high on poles so that people could be easily identified. Eventually, all important families had their own coats of arms.

This is the Tudor coat of arms. What do you think the lions and fleurs-de-lis symbolise?

All coats of arms have symbols that represent the things the family want to portray. In the Tudor coat of arms, the fleur-de-lis symbolises purity and light, while the lion represents bravery and strength. The colours of a coat of arms are also important. Red represents strength in battle and blue represents truth and loyalty.

A <u>heart</u> symbolises: Charity and love towards others












A <u>snake</u> symbolises: Wisdom

A <u>sword</u> symbolises: Justice, honour in battle



Today you will be designing your own coat of arms to reflect who you are. How do you think we could do this?






You then need to plan out your coat of arms. Decide where you want each colour and symbol to go.




The first thing you will need to do is to choose which colours and symbols you want to use to represent yourself.












Once you have finalised your design, you can sketch the shape of your coat of arms onto a large sheet of cardboard or card.
