

A Successful Start

To help you to support your child in having a smooth transition into Year 1 in September, we feel that the following information will assist you.

Please also note that a wealth of information, such as <u>school policies</u>, can be found on the <u>school's website</u>.



The School Day

In September, school will start promptly each morning at 8.50 am. However, the KS1 entrance – situated to the left of the main office - will be open from 8.40 am.



During this time, children in Year 1 will complete recap activities in Maths or English. Therefore, it is advised that children are in school as early as possible.

The School Day

The school day will finish at 3:05pm and children should be collected **promptly** from outside the KS1 entrance at this time, unless they are attending Clubhouse or an extracurricular club.





Break times & Snacks:

The children will spend break times on the Year 1 playground and lunch times on the Key Stage 1 playground (weather depending) pictured below.





Children are encouraged to bring a healthy snack and a bottle of water (ideally reusable) to school. Children can bring fruit, yogurt, dried fruits and other healthy snacks **only**. Please ensure that grapes are cut in half.

Leave of Absence:

Children are in school for 190 days. This means there are 175 days for holidays etc. The school no longer has holiday forms in operation. Only applications for exceptional leave should be given to the school.

Any child whose absence has been unauthorised for longer than 4.5 days may result in a fine for the parents. This is the Department for Education's policy which the school <u>must</u> adhere to. Ofsted will also ensure the school complies with this.



Attendance:

Attendance of 95% for the year equals 10 days that your child has been absent, that is 2 full school weeks of your child's learning missed for that year.

Attendance of 90% for the year equals 19 days that your child has been absent, that is almost 4 school weeks missed.

Attendance of 85% for the year equals 29 days that your child has been absent per, that is almost 6 school weeks missed.

Punctuality matters:

Being frequently late for school adds up to lost learning:

Arriving 5 minutes late every day adds up to over 3 days lost each year;

Arriving 15 minutes late every day adds up to 2 weeks absence a year;

Arriving 30 minutes late every adds up to 19 days absence a year.



<u>Uniform</u>

All children should wear the correct school uniform. This includes the school's indoor and outdoor PE kit. **All uniform should be labelled**.

Please note, as per policy: children <u>must</u> wear a charcoal grey jumper/cardigan and the school's charcoal jogging suit with school logo that can only be purchased from Whittakers, Southport or from Team TSP's pre-loved uniform shop. Wearing school uniform forms part of the school's safeguarding procedures so it is important that all our families abide to this.

Parents should always consult with school if a modification to the school's uniform is required for their child's needs.

Uniform

Children in Year 1 should only bring to school:

- A small packed lunch bag (if not having school dinners);
- School PE kit bag when attending an extracurricular club;
- School book bag on their reading day, to transport books to and from school.

On occasions, where children may need to bring a larger bag to school, parents should provide school with the reason for this. Due to the **limited locker space**, large bags are **not** to be brought to school on a daily basis.

<u>PE</u>

All children will access two hours of allocated PE time per week.

On the two days allocated for your child's PE lessons, your child is to come to school wearing their outdoor PE kit.

If a child is unable to take part in a PE lesson, an email should be sent from the parent/guardian to the child's class teacher.

The children will have their first PE lesson of the week on Wednesday afternoon.

The children will have their second PE lesson of the week on Thursday morning.

Please ensure your child comes to school each Wednesday and Thursday wearing their full outdoor PE kit.



PE Kits

Children should come to school wearing their PE Kit on their designated PE days and wear their Winter Uniform for Autumn Term 2 (after the October half term) and Spring Term 1 (before February half term).

Reading

As part of the children's Read Write Inc. phonics sessions, the children in Year 1 will read daily to an adult. During these sessions, adults will support them with their phonetical awareness, pronunciation a decoding skills providing them with feedback. Each week, the book the child has read in class during these sessions will be sent home to develop their fluency. These books are matched to their phonetical ability. This means that, all being well, your child is able to read the book sent home with confidence. In addition to this, they will also receive an extra 'Book Bag Book' which they will not have read that week, this book will be the same level as their reading book.

Please record in your child's Reading Record Book if they have read at home. The book is for parent use only.

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All children's reading books will be brought to school on a **Thursday** and reissued on the **Friday**.

Additional Home Learning

Additional Home Learning

Regular practice of number bonds and counting forwards and backwards to/across 100 will benefit and support your child's mathematical knowledge and understanding.

Within the curriculum, there is an increased emphasis on place value understanding before moving onto more complex written methods. Therefore, children have a better conceptual understanding of number and can more competently link to real-life problem solving.

By the end of Year 1 National Curriculum expectations are that children can count in 1s, 2s, 5s and 10s. Children should be able to count, read and write numbers to 100 in numerals as well as write numbers to 20 in words.

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
Behaviour and Anti Bullying Posters
